Speakers on programs developed to assist injured soldiers include: James Geiling, MD, Chief of Medical Services and Director of the Intensive Care Unit at the VAMC; Colonel Chris O'Connell, flight and critical care ground transport nurse at Dartmouth-Hitchcock's Advance Response Team; and, Joseph Rosen, MD, Professor of Surgery (Plastic-Reconstruction) at Dartmouth Medical School and of Engineering at the Thayer School.

During the 2008 Symposium week, we will feature a program for regional high school students, an art exhibit by Iraqi children, and a film screening for undergraduate and graduate students on soldiers' and war photographers' risk-taking to record their experiences. A video memorial to fallen Vermont soldiers, 2007's The Vermont Fallen, will be shown in the Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center Health Education Center.
